


WHY MEASLES IS A THREAT WE IGNORED TOO LONG


WHY AI WILL NEVER BE ERROR-FREE IN MEDICINE

Transparent design, continuous monitoring, and human oversight are crucial. In medicine, small errors can be fatal. Accepting AI's limits is essential to using it responsibly in life-critical settings.



WHY INDIA'S EV BATTERY PUSH IS FALTERING

India's electric vehicle battery scheme struggles due to delays, unclear incentives, and supply-chain dependence. 
over the years.

Doctors at PGIMER have achieved a major breakthrough in treating Celphos poisoning, one of India's deadliest toxic exposures. Aluminium phosphide poisoning has long carried high fatality due to lack of antidotes. The new protocol improves survival through early intervention and targeted supportive care. This advance could significantly reduce deaths, especially in rural areas where poison exposure is common. Experts stress the need to update national treatment guidelines and train frontline doctors. The breakthrough highlights how clinical innovation can save lives even without new drugs. Timely medical response remains the most powerful antidote.

5. Decorate with colors or patterns.





What Is a Budget, Its History in India, and Why It Matters to Everyone

A budget is a financial plan that outlines expected income and proposed expenditure over a specific period. It is a tool of discipline and foresight—helping individuals, institutions, and governments decide how resources will be used. At the national level, a budget reflects a country's priorities; at the personal level, it shapes financial security and future stability.

WHAT IS A BUDGET?

In simple terms, a budget is a statement of income and expenses. It answers three basic questions:

How much money is available? Where will it come from? How will it be spent?

For governments, a budget includes taxation, public spending, welfare schemes, and development projects. For indi-

viduals, it includes salary or earnings, savings, and daily or long-term expenses.

HISTORY OF THE BUDGET IN INDIA

India's budgetary system has colonial roots. The first formal budget in India was presented in 1860 by , who was the Finance Member of the British Indian Council. His aim was to reorganize revenue after the 1857 Revolt.

After Independence in 1947, the budget became a central instrument of national planning and economic development under the . Over time, the Indian budget evolved from a tool of control into a framework for growth, poverty reduction, and infrastructure development. Major reforms, such as the shift from paper briefcases to digital presentations and the merging of railway and general budgets, have modernized the process.
